VETERAN'S DAY: HONORING THOSE WHO SERVED

Veteran's Day honors everyone who has served in the military. Whether they served in wartime, as a nurse, or linguist - anyone who has dedicated all, or a portion of, their careers to serving our country is honored on Veteran's Day. Originally called Armistice Day, it is celebrated annually on November 11 to recognize and honor the end of World War I (at 11 am on the 11th day of the 11th month). After World War II, the name was changed to Veteran's Day.



Memorial Day, on the other hand, is significant in that it honors the lives of military personnel who died in service to our country. Memorial Day was first observed in 1868 to commemorate fallen soldiers of the Civil War. In 1971, Congress passed the Uniform Monday Holiday Act to establish Memorial Day on the last Monday of May.
